# Krista Stack Inside the Larsen Design Studio: Working With a Legend

More than a weaver, Mr. Larsen was a scholar, world traveler, and an authority on traditional and contemporary crafts.

Krista Stack spent the first six years of her career in the textiles industry working in the Larsen Design Studio with Jack Lenor Larsen. His mentorship was the fulfillment of a dream as she had long admired his work. In this talk she will review many of the superstars of his collection, varying in technique, process and inspiration. She will also discuss the process of designing industrially produced fabrics from the viewpoint of a handweaver. In remembering her days in the Larsen studio, she will also share the personal side of wisdom, advice and direction given by Jack.

LongHouse Reserve, a 16 acre reserve and sculpture garden located in East Hampton, N.Y., was built as a case study to exemplify a creative approach to contemporary life. Open to the public, LongHouse features pieces from Buckminster Fuller, Yoko Ono and Willem de Kooning, to name a few.

Krista will also share some of her own current work from her 24 shaft Compu-Dobby in her Brooklyn studio.

#### **About the Artist**



Daughter of a weaver, Krista began weaving when she was 2 years old and "borrowed" her older sister's loom. Much later she graduated Magna Cum Laude from Brown University, having concurrently studied at the Rhode Island School of Design. She has won weaving awards both domestically and internationally.

Moving to New York City, Krista spent six years in the Larsen Design Studio, where she became Director of Design in 1997. After later working for mills in Turkey and India, she started Krista Stack Design and worked both in industry

and with custom projects. She currently works with Lori Weitzner on the Weitzner <u>collection</u> of textiles. She is also an advocate and Advisory Board member of <u>Nest</u>, an

organization that works to support artisans around the world. She also does fine arts weaving in her studio on her Compu-Dobby loom.

# SUSTAINABILITY MATTERS

As we weave through the winter, we're all wondering when the pandemic will end. In this spirit of looking toward a better future, here are some of the innovative fibers coming down the pipeline. You may be surprised to find yourself weaving with algae instead of polyester in a few years, but you'll be happy that these new materials are far more eco-friendly than our current ones.

One of the new fibers is Spinnova, from the Finnish company by the same name. That company claims to have developed "the most sustainable fibre in the world, both from a raw material and fibre making process aspect." Made from cellulose using no harmful chemicals, the manufacturing process uses 99.5 percent less water in its production than cotton. And, the fiber is completely biodegradable as well as 100 percent "upcyclable." (A new word enters the vocabulary!)

New York-based Algiknit says it is developing "durable yet rapidly degradable yarns from kelp, one of the most regenerative organisms on the planet." Aquaculture, the basis of their raw material, also becomes a link in a cooperative chain of relationships with other forms of marine and shellfish farming dependent on kelp and supporting an equitable survival and growth of the marine ecosystem.

Squitex (Philadelphia) has developed a unique protein structure originally found in squids' tentacles using genetic sequencing and synthetic biology tools. that is entirely natural as well as recyclable. Strong and selfhealing, the fiber targets usage in textiles, coatings that reduce microfiber shedding, and adhesives for electronic and other industrial applications. Teaming with U.K. designer to construct a trench coat using Squitex adhesives, the company was awarded the Sustainability Special Prize at the Future Technology Event in Hong Kong in 2019.

These and other innovative fibers are poised to enter the market. The textile industry is estimated to be the second most polluting industry in the world, so keep an eye out and consider giving them a try as they appear!

### FABSCRAP

Non-profit organization FABSCRAP has a goal to end commercial textile waste and create opportunities for reuse of textilerelated materials from design and fashion companies in NYC. They




have mostly fabric, but there is a selection of super fine coned yarn, leather, trims, and upholstery.

Items change frequently so be sure to visit often.

The original FABSCRAP warehouse is in Brooklyn and a second outlet has recently opened in Philadelphia. Both warehouses now offer in-person shopping by appointment as well as online shopping.




# Learn Online with Selvedge






Structure:	Single Huck with Skip Dents

Sett:	3 per dent (5 times), skip dent, 3/dent, skip, 3/dent, skip
	(skips indicated with empty ends)
Weaver:	M. A. Solensten





Structure:	Plain Weave Blocks with Long Floats
Shafts:	8
Sett:	12
Warp/Weft:	Slubbed rayon and flax
Weaver:	Mrs. William Justema








Use shafts 7 & 8 and picks 7 & 8 for plain weave borders to stabilize the fabric.


