Originating in the Iron Age, card weaving, also known as tablet weaving, is enjoying a surge in popularity lately as it is rediscovered by weavers of today. Marilyn will discuss the theory, the history, and many of the weaving techniques themselves, and present examples sure to awe and inspire.

Marilyn is the author of Creative Crafts of the World: Lessons Plans for Teaching Folk Art to Kids. She has created six video classes, two documentary/travelogues of folk art techniques at Taproot Video online, and has released her first featurelength documentary film Interlacement: Threads & Lives, a film about 'friendship through handwoven fabric.' She writes for Handwoven and Shuttle Spindle and Dyepot magazines and lectures at the Seattle Art Museum and Friends of Asian Art. She also takes small groups of weavers and textile enthusiasts to various countries around the world.
