Robin Kang

Core Memory: Woven Technologies of the Past & Future

Utilizing a digitally operated Jacquard hand loom, Robin hand weaves



tapestries that combine mythic symbolism, computer-related imagery, and digital markmaking. She works with hand-dyed cotton and wool, metallic, holographic yarns, raffia, and tencel.

Her artwork reclaims weaving as a computational craft, revealing the feminine influence of weaving in the development of modern computing. Utilizing a hand-operated digital Jacquard loom, the contemporary version of the first binary-operated machine and precursor to the

invention of the computer, she handweaves tapestries that invoke mythic symbolism, computer-related imagery, digital mark-making, and cyber mysticism. The juxtaposition of

textiles with electronics opens conversations of reconciling old traditions with new possibilities, and relationships between textiles, symbols, language, memory, and the sacred.

Honoring the sacred histories of textile arts, Kang has studied ancient techniques with Mayan, Quechua, and Scandinavian weavers and has been initiated into the Amazonian Shipibo-Conibo tradition to learn the mystical textile techniques of the lineage.

Recognized by a 2017 NYFA Fellowship in Craft/Sculpture, her work has been exhibited at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, Queens Museum, Newcomb Museum of Tulane, Essl Museum Vienna, John Michael Kohler Arts Center, Kunstraum Niederösterreich, and the US Embassy in Saudi Arabia. Her work has been featured in the New York Times, Chicago Tribune, ArtInfo, ArtNews, Brooklyn Magazine, WhiteHot Magazine, and Hyperallergic.com. Kang earned an MFA from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, and has taught at Tyler School of Art, Parsons, and RISD. Also a Reiki master and sound healer, Kang is an Initiatic student of Maestro Manuel Rufino and an Ollintlahuimetztli Moondancer.



Sonia Delaunay (1885–1979) was one of the most influential artists of the twentieth century. Her remarkably diverse and interconnected body of work focused on the primacy of color and a synthesis of the arts. Painter, artisan, and designer, she embraced modernity and harnessed



the creative power of collaboration in the realms of fashion, textiles, interiors, books, mosaics, and tapestries. Living Art comprises almost 200 objects secured from major international lenders, reflecting Delaunay's kaleidoscopic output through all periods of her career from the early Parisian avant-garde of the 1910s to the spirited 1970s.

SWEDISH FOLK WEAVINGS FOR MARRIAGE, CARRIAGE, AND HOME 1750–1840

This spring, step into the rural Swedish countryside of the 18th and 19th centuries when the exhibition Swedish Folk Weavings for Marriage, Carriage, and Home 1750–1840 opens at the American Swedish Historical Museum (ASHM) in FDR Park. Composed of rare and artful cushions and bed covers woven and stitched by skilled women for their households, this exhibition will enchant visitors of all ages with whimsical designs created using a variety of methods and featuring real and mythical creatures, geometric patterns, and floral motifs of all kinds.



The majority of the textiles featured in this exhibition were done by women living on farms in southern Sweden where skill in weaving and textile production was considered an important resource to bring to a household. While the decline of this textile tradition happened as farming life changed, the cushions and pillows became "Sunday Culture," appearing only Sundays and special occasions rather than every day. This undoubtedly preserved their bright colors and delicate structures so that we can appreciate them today. ASHM is excited to share a piece of the Swedish countryside and rural lifestyle with visitors in the United States.
