Echo Threadings: The Warp that Keeps on Giving with Denise Kovnat

Denise Kovnat has taught weaving on site and online across the United States, Canada, and Australia. In 2022 she published Weaving Outside the Box: 12 Projects for Creating Dimensional Cloth, which focused on projects for 4 to 16 shafts that pleat, pucker, buckle, and shapeshift in the finishing process. She has won international, regional and local awards for her work and her garments have been juried into Convergence fashion shows since 2008. She is most proud of helping to establish the Weaving and Fiber Arts Center in Rochester, NY in 2002. She blogs about weaving and the related fiber arts at denisekovnat.com.

Fiber Art Awards:



An Ecology of Quilts: The Natural History of American Textiles

American Folk Art Museum

This exhibition brings together approximately 30 examples, spanning the 18th to 20th centuries, from the Museum's rich collection of more than 600 quilts and presents them from an ecological perspective, tracing patterns of relationships between the environment and traditional quilting practices.



TAILORING BLACK STYLE

Superfine: Tailoring Black Style

This exhibition explores the importance of style to the formation of Black identities in the Atlantic diaspora, particularly in the United States and Europe. Through a presentation of garments and accessories, paintings, photographs, decorative arts, and more, from the 18th century to today, the exhibition interprets the concept of dandyism as both an aesthetic and a strategy that allowed for new social and political possibilities.

The Queer Mechanix of the Lands Currently Referred to as the & Canada Before & During the 54th Year of the Stonewall Era

Artist LJ Roberts presents a cartography of queer auto mechanics as a multi-media project, combining large-scale textile with printmaking and sound. Roberts' interdisciplinary practice addresses queer and trans politics, nomadism, and kinship structures.



One Thousand and One Threads

Kapow Gallery 23 Monroe Street

through September 28

In this presentation, Camille Eskell asserts femininity—its codes of dress, decoration, body, sexuality, and spirit—as a commanding act, reclaiming presence and power by constructing an unapologetic matriarchal framework. Inspired by heroine queens of the Middle East, the title of the exhibition references the book One Thousand and One Nights, in which Queen Scheherazade tells stories to her new husband King Shahryar, a man known to murder his wives after one night of matrimony.



Fibration III: Anxiety and Hope L'Space

524 W 19th St.

through October 25

This third edition of Fibration centers on the emotional tension between upheaval and optimism, a timely reflection on a world shaped by war, migration, political rupture, and shifting identities. Subtitled Anxiety and Hope, the exhibition invites viewers into an immersive environment where softness collides with sharp critique, and threads become instruments of resistance.



<u>Pranati Panda: Weaving What We Carry</u>

Aicon Contemporary 35 Great Jones St.

Pranati Panda presents a body of work that is as introspective as it is expansive —mapping the slow and deliberate paths by which time, memory, and selfhood accumulate shape. This solo exhibition marks a key moment in Panda's practice: a synthesis of process and poetics that speaks to the layered terrain of personal and collective becoming. Working across drawing, textile, and object-making, Panda's materials remain intimate and often tactile—threads, fibers, lines drawn in meditative rhythm.



<u>Erin M. Riley: Life Looks Like a House For a Few Hours</u>

PPOW Gallery 392 Broadway

through October 18

In a new body of meticulously crafted and powerfully vulnerable large-scale weavings, domestic scenes congeal and dissolve amidst family photos, car crashes, iPhone selfies, and newspaper clippings. Collaging moments from her past and present, Riley intersperses images of herself with memories of her childhood home before it was lost in a storm of separation, alleged affairs, and foreclosure.



Kay Sekimachi: A Personal Archive

Andrew Kreps Gallery 22 Courtland St.

through November 1

A pioneer of weaving, both on and off the loom, Sekimachi developed a singular body of work over the course of seven decades. Often referred to as a "weaver's weaver," Sekimachi's work synthesizes traditional craft, with innovative techniques and her own Japanese heritage. Working in series, often employing a singular material or fiber, Sekimachi pushed the individual characteristics of textile, sculptural dimensions.



Dana Barnes: Untamed Gestures

The first major museum exhibition spotlighting the artist's singular vision, Dana Barnes: Untamed Gestures features monumental handformed fiber works alongside a fully immersive recreation of Barnes's Lower East Side studio in New York City.

Hank Willis Thomas: I Am Many

Jack Shainman Gallery 46 Lafayette Street

through November 1

Bringing together large-scale sculptures, retroreflective, lenticular and textile works along with a group of mixed-media assemblages, I AM MANY continues Thomas' investigation into the myriad of ways that the past and present remain interwoven and interconnected. These works explore the legacies of exploitation and oppression in conjunction with new forms of community and solidarity.



<u>Moved By Forces</u>

Slag Gallery 522 W 19th St.

through October 25

The exhibition features a collection of five new textile "carcass" sculptures. Included are two freestanding forms influenced by "Caryatids" the ancient female columnar figures serving as architectural supports. In this arrangement, two of these works will be displayed in the front room of the gallery, while three will be showcased in the main gallery alongside "Narcissus" with one "Colossus" in each space. This dynamic composition transcends the spatial limits of the gallery, evoking associations with urban planning and neurological pathways.

Maria Nepomuceno: Cunhó

Sikkema Malloy Jenkins 530 W. 22nd St.

through October 11

Maria Nepomuceno's chimerical sculptures and wall installations meld the organic with the inorganic, in both shape and substance. Her practice integrates traditional Brazilian craftsmanship and contemporary materials into her own personal techniques of sewing, weaving, beading, and ceramics.





Jordan Nassar: Revelation

James Cohan Gallery 48 Walker Street

through October 4

In REVELATION, Nassar reimagines traditional craft techniques across expansive multipanel embroideries and transportative mosaics to explore inherited nostalgia, history, and heritage. His recent embroideries are poignant meditations on color, as well as light and darkness; they reveal and conceal brilliantly-hued landscapes. In the front gallery, mosaics echoing Byzantine ruins wrap around the walls, eliciting the past in a contemporary site.

Chiharu Shiota: Two Home Countries

Japan Society 333 E. 47th St

through January 11, 2026

Commemorating the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II, Chiharu Shiota: Two Home Countries centers on a site-specific installation that explores wartime experiences and memories. Placing the original installation in dialogue with other works from Shiota's oeuvre, the exhibition creates parallels between the humanitarian tragedy of war and the artist's personal struggles, including confronting her mortality and her bicultural identity living between two home countries.





Gospel of the Working Class Fields Project Gallery Gallery

526 W. 26th St, #807

through October 5

The three works: "I Walk," "Mill Town" and "These Hands" picture, respectively, a 1918 Chattanooga trolley carmen's strike, a 1934 textile workers strike and the unionization of a Volkswagen plant with the United Auto Workers in Chattanooga last year. The works — each of which took Arnold more than 200 hours to create — are an homage to Chattanooga's workers, the artist said, and weave together contemporary and historic labor battles in her hometown.
