# Testing, Testing: Weaving "Tech Checks" in Tapestry A Workshop with Molly Elkind

We all know that we're supposed to sample, but when you're excited to start

weaving, it can feel like sampling gets in the way. View slides and examine real-life examples to discover how making little studies or trial runs can save you hours of tedious un-weaving and make you a happier, better weaver.

Analyze tapestry designs and cartoons to determine what type of sampling to do, and at what stage in the process. Who knows? Your sample might even be worth framing!



No need for a loom in this class. We'll focus on pencil and paper exercises and discussion. Suitable for weavers with basic tapestry skills.

#### About the Artist

Molly Elkind's tapestry work was exhibited in a solo show in 2018 in Atlanta, just before she relocated to New Mexico. She has focused on weaving for over ten years, but is also fluent in papermaking, mixed media collage, and embroidery. Molly earned an M.A. in Studio Art from the Hite Art Institute at the University of Louisville in 2002, and in the same year she was awarded an Artist Enrichment grant by the Kentucky Foundation for Women. Exhibition highlights include a solo show at Mercer University in Atlanta (2009) and numerous juried and invitational shows nationwide. Molly has been published in Tapestry Topics





(American Tapestry Alliance publication), Tapestry Weaver (Britain), Arts Across Kentucky, Needlearts, SAQA Journal, and Shuttle, Spindle, Dyepot magazines. Her work is in several private collections.

Besides making art, Molly is passionate about teaching it, with a particular focus on design principles and processes. For over 20 years she has taught private students and at guilds and conferences nationwide, with a special emphasis on helping fiber artists become more confident designers of their own work. Molly currently serves on the board of the American Tapestry Alliance as the Director of Volunteers. She is based in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Molly Elkind is based in Santa Fe, New Mexico. ### LIVING NATIONAL TREASURES

#### Does the United States recognize "Living National Treasures" the way that Japan does?

The discussion that followed the September NYGH Movie Night hosted by Gigi Matthews and Kate Ohara raised this question. In Japan, certification is given to 'individuals who are able to embody a performing art designated as an <u>Important</u> <u>Intangible Cultural Property</u> at the highest level,' that is to say, performance, music, craft techniques with particularly high historical or artistic value for Japan. The Japanese government provides a special annual subsidy of 2 million yen (\$18,193 US) to recipients.

> On behalf of the American people, the federal government recognizes outstanding achievement in the arts through the National Endowment for the Arts

National Heritage Fellowships, the nation's highest honor in folk and traditional arts, and the National Medal of Arts, a presidential award.

The NEA National Heritage Fellows are each awarded a one time gift of \$25,000. Fellowship recipients are nominated by the public, often by members of their own communities, and then judged by a panel of experts in the folk and traditional arts. The panel's recommendations are reviewed by the National Council on the Arts, which sends its recommendations to the Arts Endowment chairman, who makes the final decision.

The Arts Endowment has awarded 458 National Heritage Fellowships since 1982,

recognizing artists working in more than 200 distinct art forms. Among the textile artists honored are: Kelly Church, black ash basket maker, Manuel Cuevas, rodeo tailor, Mary Lee Bendolph, Lucy Mingo, and Loretta Pettway, the chief quilters of Gee's Bend quiltmakers, Irvin Trujillo, Rio Grande weaver, and Alfredo Campos, horsehair hitcher.

Honorees aren't limited to craftspeople and recipients have included Donny Goldman, Irish stepdancer, Sosei Shizuye Matsumoto, Japanese Chado tea ceremony master, and Dolly Jacobs, circus aerialist.

An alternative is to figure out how much weft you'll need to complete the project--a very different proposition to weaving a scarf. 

#### **TRAVEL:** <u>Textiles of Egypt</u>





### Testing, Testing: Weaving Tech Checks in Tapestry

#### I. **PowerPoint:**

- A. "Sampling" vs. "a sampler." A broad approach to sampling.
- B. What are some aspects of your tapestry you can sample for?

#### 1. Value and Color

Yarn wraps Woven color samples Weft blends—laid straight or twisted Value check with camera

#### 2. Techniques

Hatching Pick and pick Outlining Wedge weave Inclusion of found objects, surface embellishment Any technique that is new to you

#### 3. Direction of weaving

Steep slanted vertical lines in your design may mean you should weave from the side.

#### 4. Warp sett (epi) + yarn weights

Match the scale of the piece to the warp sett and the size of your loom. 2-warp rule: the smallest detail on your cartoon should span at least two warps, to avoid single-warp wrapping.

1:1:1: The thickness of the warp=the thickness of the weft=space between the warp Weft bundles should be approximately equal in size for consistent woven surface.

#### 5. Fibers and unusual materials

Any yarn fiber or materials new to you

#### 6. Design

Tricky bits in your cartoon such as faces, lettering, complex shapes—whatever you're not sure about.

### WORKSHOP HANDOUT, page 2

- II. **Practice** sampling. The list below looks like a sequential, linear process, but it's more like a circle or spiral in practice
  - A. Sketch: Study your chosen inspiration image carefully, thinking about what elements you want to emphasize and which ones to de-emphasize or leave out. Use a pencil and paper (plain or graph paper) and sketch the *main lines and shapes*. It's OK to make a bunch of small thumbnail sketches to start with. Try several different arrangements, formats, and compositions.
  - B. Once you have a design you like, scale it up to a size you can work with, if needed, and make several photocopies or tracings. Use colored pencils to try out different color palettes. Refine and edit your design as you go, thinking about how you could weave each part.
  - C. Make notes on your copy or tracing about colors, weft yarns, direction of weaving, sett, and techniques and how you will sample for these.
  - D. Make yarn wraps to try out actual yarns from your stash.
  - E. Weave one or more samples that tests colors, fibers, warp yarn and sett, weft thickness, direction of weaving, specific techniques
- III. **Is your sample a finished piece?** Can you finish the edges, mount it, and display it? If you think you might want to, keep this in mind as you warp your loom and decide how to handle your warp ends and hems.
