### My Production Weaving Journey with Tina Bliss

Tina Bliss worked as a graphic designer for over 40 years in New York. She shifted to weaving in late 2000s with the acquisition of a "free" countermarch floor loom. Thus her weaving journey began. After joining the New York Guild of Handweavers, she attended 2 semesters of Continuing Education "Intro to Weaving" at FIT. Bliss studied with Becky Ashenden at the Vävstuga Weaving School and attended several MAFA workshops.

During her time serving on the NYGH Board, she met then-Vice President and textile designer Soraya Shah. After modifying her Glimakra Standard loom to a 24-shaft Toika computer-assist, Bliss and Shah started working together in 2017. Bliss moved to Maine in 2019 along with husband and two dogs to focus on weaving in a dedicated studio. In addition to weaving bespoke upholstery fabric, Bliss participates in local craft fairs, selling various textiles for home and fashion. Bliss is a regular zoom attendee for the Jockey Hollow Weaving Wizards.

#### **NYGH Member Spotlight Carol Chave** (Member for over 25 years!)

From Carol's Website:

Guild of Handweav I paint with wool, mentally reworking the germ of an idea for weeks or months before going to the loom to realize it. Color is important; if I can't find the colors I need, I dye yarn. The texture of the wool and interplay of the strands of yarn enrich the quality of the color.

Originally located in DUMBO, Brooklyn, my studio is now in a log cabin in the Appalachian Mountains of New Jersey. My work is influenced by my life: travels, visits to museums and galleries, family, friends, and environment. My fiber paintings have been seen in shows throughout the United States, including the Denise Bibro Gallery in Chelsea, NYC, and in Canada. Represented by the Maria Elena Kravetz Gallery of Argentina, my paintings were shown at SOFA Chicago and Art Palm Springs.




# An Exciting 2025-2026 Season






# Calling All Library Books

### Juliet Martin: The Moment Before You Run

440 Gallery 440 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue Brooklyn


Through May 25

Martin writes of her work... "I am vulnerable. I work in fiber and mixed media. Weaving. Drawing. Printmaking. Digital imaging. Sculpting Masonite. Collaging materials brings whimsy and curiosity – How did you do that? (Are they asking about the process, or the pain?) Weaving becomes my noun and my verb.

### Woven Histories - Textiles and Modern Abstraction

MOMA April 20 - September 13

Textiles touch every aspect of our lives and connect us to history. "Threads were among the earliest transmitters of meaning," the artist Anni Albers wrote in 1965. This show reveals the links between this art form and abstraction. Incorporating basketry, apparel, and more than a century of other textile works that challenge accepted divisions between fine art and craft, this exhibition broadens the story of abstraction, suggesting that not only ideas but materials—like woven, knotted, and braided fabric—are crucial to its understanding and success.

After a rigorous jurying process, 59 artists from both organizations were invited to participate in this conversation, which highlights the enduring connections between quilting and basketry, as well as the relationship between beauty and functionality.

# Fannie's Finds

### Improvisational Nature: The Weavings and Drawings of Silvia Heyden

Through June 7

The first New York solo exhibition for the late tapestry weaver Silvia Heyden (1927 - 2015), and the first exhibition of the artist's tapestries and drawings in the U.S. since 1972. The exhibition brings together ten tapestries, as well as a selection of works on paper, made by the artist between 1973 to 2014.

# A Head Full of Planets

The American Folk Art Museum 2 Lincoln Square

#### Through May 25

The woven embroideries are made of commercial, acrylic yarn, an unforgiving medium often associated with grade school weaving kits and resale store afghans. But the artist's quadros de lã ("wool paintings") miraculously, almost magically, transcend categories of high and low, craft and painting. Not only is her art powerful and singular, but it holds the cultural residue of a woman adhering to and celebrating her own identity and homeland, despite her marginalized status as a Black woman from rural Brazil.



# <u>Élise Peroi- For Thirsting Flowers</u>

Carvalho Park 110 Waterbury St. Brooklyn

Through May 23

Onto graceful wooden frames, the French artist weaves ethereal, layered screens evocative of dreamy portals to nature. "The luminosity of Peroi's woven paintings is such that we might feel ourselves carried outside to watch the sky brighten, the air soft against our skin," says Dr. Rebecca Birrell in an essay accompanying Peroi's solo exhibition
